

Duke Professor Named Group's President-Elect

Duke University's Dr. Richard H. Leach is the president-elect of the newly formed North Carolina Political Science Association.

Leach, professor of political science and director of graduate studies in political science, was elected during the professional group's recent organizational meeting at Appalachian State University in Boone.

He will take office in April 1972, succeeding Professor Richter H. Moore Jr., chairman of the department of political science at Appalachian. Political scientists from approximately 30 colleges and universities attended the Boone meeting.

Leach said the association hopes to enlist the approximately 150 political scientists in the state in an effort to improve instruction in political science in North Carolina, develop methods of cooperating on curriculum development and research, establish and improve relations between academic political scientists and both public officials and public school teachers, "and generally to encourage a great-

er understanding of government and politics throughout the schools of North Carolina."

It will not be the association's purpose, he added, to take stands on public policy issues.
